

May Club Report

The Board met for the hour preceding the meeting. The contract (\$2300) for the 2024 show at the Oshkosh Convention Center has been signed and paid.

A projector and screen have been purchased for club use at our meetings and shows; they were used at our 2023 show and May meeting. The remote control went AWOL at the show and a replacement will be ordered. The show presentations were well received, but the acoustics and lighting were problematic. The best solution of using a separate room was discussed. The presentations would be away from the show noise and where the lighting could be controlled without impacting the exhibitors. The separate room option is currently too expensive. To improve the lighting and sound adjustments in screen location and microphone usage will be made. The need for a hands free microphone for presenters was evident. Harold Mohr was one of our presenters and on behalf of the Waupaca club asked to borrow our projector for their November show.

The Board will meet in June to review club show competition judging rules and guidelines.

Nine new members joined at the show and one former member rejoined. Further details about the annual show are elsewhere in this newsletter.

The Board also discussed carving classes, including upcoming OSC classes. The club sponsored Popp deer and Jensen chip carving classes went well. The Guge Shrike class may need to be cancelled due to insufficient enrollment.

Club finances & other activities and carving related matters including the Deforest (Madison area), Janesville, Denmark (NEWWG) & Waupaca Shows were reviewed. Possible presentations for the 2023-2024 club year were also discussed.

The Board authorized funds for proceeding with the new cabinet project to house our growing Library collections. Chris Rigotti and Rodney Manthey are leading that project and hope to have a cabinet built over this summer.

The general meeting was opened at 1:37 pm by President Tim Gosz. Total attendance was 42. Following the Treasurer's Report, Tim Gosz provided a recap of the 2023 Chippers Show. The consensus was that the show was a success. Library time, snacks, Show 'N Tell and a slide Presentation by Paul Wolters were held.

Gene Bengel volunteered to be the club contact for a Club table at the August Winnebago County Fair where soap carving instruction would be offered to children attending the fair.

June Board Report

The Board met June 17th at Cedric Richeson's house and was called to order at 3:05 pm. May minutes and Treasurer's Report were approved. From the Suggestion Box, a Habitat Class was requested and a designated spot for returning library books. An update on the bookcase project was given. Future class ideas discussed were: bark carving, walleye, habitat, painting, airbrush and sharpening. Presenations were for club meetings were also discussed. The need for a camera holding tripod and hansfree microphone wee further discussed and Chris Rigotti and Tim Gosz offered to loan those respective items to the club as the need arises.

June Club Report continued

Board Review of Judging Rules & Guidelines for Competition - Highlights

Judging rules and guidelines for the Chippers Carving competitions were reviewed. Comments from club members were requested in advance and discussed along with the Board members' research and review of the club's current rules and guidelines.

This review included reference to other competitions' rules especially of area clubs. There were many thoughtful comments received from club members. By consensus our existing rules compare favorably to those of other clubs. Having a standard set of rules for all area clubs does not appear likely. Competition rules often seem to vary due to tradeoffs associated with a club's interests and resource availability for manning a competition. The number of skill levels vs number of categories vs number of entrants and entries are all considerations. Another consideration was the distinction between rules, guidelines, and leaving matters to the discretion of an informed Judge. Better education of competition entrants as to the rules and to those aspects of judging that may enhance their chances of winning ribbons as well as providing additional instruction to Judges were identified as needs.

The Board recommended very few changes to the rules, but decided upon a course of education as having the greatest benefit to the membership.

It was decided that a carver that wins "Best of Show", **as defined by our club,** should move up **two** skill levels. This is regardless of which club's show the award is granted. However, some clubs have used "Best of Show" terminology in the sense that we use "Best of Class". For example, in the past, the Wisconsin River Club awarded Best of Show - Novice; Best of Show Intermediate, Best of Show Advanced and Overall Best of Show. In that case, a novice who won "Best of Show - Novice" would be treated as winning Best of Class and move up one level to Intermediate, however if the Novice won "Overall Best of Show" they would move up two levels into our Open category. The rationale is that winning Best of Show shows a large advance of skill, yet the size of competitions from show to show may vary the quality of competition so a two level advance would be most equitable.

A common suggestion was to limit non-wood attributes of a carving to a certain percentage e.g. less than 10%. It was felt that this was best left to the discretion of the Judges and to educating entrants as to the value and weight placed by judges on carving over use of e.g. pewter legs, glass eyes, synthetic materials or uncarved natural wood habitats. Our rule #2 states that "All entries must be created and carved in wood." This is understood to be primarily in wood with two exceptions, gourds and pyrography which have separate categories.

Regarding whether advancement is triggered by winning 3 blues in any show or only our show, our rules state "Ribbons won at any judged competition count towards class advancement." Another concern was the scenario where a long experienced carver who has never competed decides to enter competition and enters in the Novice class. This was felt to be unfair to actual novices. No good solution was seen other than encouraging such carvers to enter a class level more appropriate to their skill set.

One suggestion was that Masters level carvers ought to make their own cutouts. It was felt that this would be too limiting inasmuch as many master carvers may not own or have access to a bandsaw.

To further educate club members regarding rules and competitions, two presentations will be held at upcoming Chippers meetings.

June Club Report continued

Board Review of Judging Rules & Guidelines for Competition

Regarding Judges and Judging, it was suggested that entrants be advised who the Judges are for each skill level. The Board agreeds and two methods have been suggested; (a) post this information along with each Judge's Table # at the Judging Registration tables and (2) if possible on the Show program.

A concern was raised about Judges being drawn from club members. The Board agrees that it is desirable to have impartial Judges and believes the recent judges have been exemplary in their impartiality. The Board seeks to recruit Judges from outside the Club to further that goal, but must balance that against the availability of suitable Judges for our competition. This past year three of the six Judges were from our club: Binder, Popp and Wirtz. Binder is on the Board and a regular attendee; Popp teaches classes to club members and attends several meetings each year, and Wirtz does not attend meetings and while a teacher has not taught locally in recent years. To better address any future impartiality concerns the Board is adopting a recusal standard for Judges where Judges ought to recuse themselves from judging any category with entrants from classes they have taught or from classes that they have attended. Also, if a Judge enters carvings in the competition then that Judge will recuse themselves from Judging any category in which the Judge has an entry.

A question was raised about Judges picking up or otherwise touching carvings. There are three distinct views. One view is that Judges ought not touch the carving, another that the Judge could rotate the carving to view the back and a third view that the Judge ought to pick the carving up if needed to better judge it e.g. with relief carvings and other carvings where carver's utilize light to effect and to see how eyes are set. It was decided that Judges should be instructed that *generally* Judges ought not pick up the carving, but may ask the Recorder to turn it or hold it up to provide a better view of detail e.g. on small carvings and on reliefs where light effects play a role. Emphasis will be placed on instructing entrants to (1) have both names and dates on their carving, but (2) to temporarily cover their names or potentially face disqualification.

The Review was fruitful and steps are being taken to make our great competition even better.



In the 2023 Chippers competition, 50 people entered a total of 117 woodcarvings for judging.

13 people competed in the Novice Class with 18 carvings;

12 people competed in Intermediate Class with 31 carvings;

11 people competed in Open Class with 32 carvings; and

14 people in the Masters Class with 36 carvings competing.

There were entries in all categories except Mythical, Gourds, Intarsia, Marine Mammals, and Walking Sticks.

Our new category of Pyrography - Human had 3 pieces entered by 2 different people.

Our club has six bird categories which accounted for 39% of all carvings entered. The song bird, mammal, caricature, categories all had 10 or more entries. Pyrography with color, group, and fish were close behind with 8-9 entries.

Gene Bengel - Project Wood Carving

Refresh skills and work on projects alongside fellow carvers. This class is open to wood carvers using either power or hand tools.

Power tool carvers must bring a bench fan dust collector. Only carvers with current machine safety training may use designated OSC shop power equipment.

Carvers without current machine training may carve using handtools and their own hand rotary tools (e.g. Dremels) using a bench pass available from Gene.

Gene is available to instruct, guide, and problem solve to help you with projects.
