

Carving Competitions Part II Carving a Blue Ribbon Winner - Bill Kempen

At the 2023 Ward World Championship Wildfowl Carving Competitions in Maryland, Bill Kempen took first places in the Advanced Division for his Cape May Warbler songbird and his Little Green Heron wading bird.



Bill was the club presenter for January. Bill won Best of Show at the Club's 47th Annual Show last May, and offered his insights on competing in carving competitions. He noted that at Ward the competition is very keen and the Judges are very exacting and quick to notice minute details of each bird carving.

Among his many tips and comments, Bill likes to use a blue texturing stone over burning of the hard flight feathers, but he notes that will not produce the same fluffy look on breast feathers. For these Bill suggests using the Razertip featherformer burning tips.

For painting Bill uses oil paints which he finds easier to work and blend than acrylics. "Put it on thin" is his mantra. He recommends Schultz Blending medium to thin the oil paint. For painting use a round brush and dab off any excess.

In response to several questions, Bill said that he never uses gesso, but employs a sealer. Thinned down Deft brand sealer is one method. It was noted that oil paint itself is a sealer. Seal right afer burning and wear cotton gloves were other tips. Oil can be painted over acrylics, e.g. gesso, but not acrylic over oil.

It was a very informative presentation. Many thanks to Bill for sharing his insights!

The 2023 Ward Wildfowl Carving Competition Judges offer a few tips for competitors:

- Keep a journal of special sightings, take your own photos. Spend time in nature.
- Create a carving that projects well and reflect a bird's essence of specie. Surround yourself with reference material.

Summary of tips from 2023 Ward judges cont'd

- Never create a new species, even in Interpretive. Gather as much resource material as you can. Stick to originality.
- When Competing, remember to enjoy the process from start to finish. Take time to view other carvings. Make notes on what grabs your attention. Never copy someone else's work.
- Never try to impress the judges; it won't matter as there are guidelines and criteria which are followed. If judges can't come to an agreement, they will call in another.
- When a piece has bird and prey, pay close attention to how they interact. Pay special attention to how the pieces line up to each other. The use of a piece of string can be very helpful.
- Accurate color & anatomy are critical to success in competition. Collect & study good reference materials. In the tank or on the bay with other birds, an off-color bird or one with poor anatomy will be very obvious to the judges.
- Learn how to sand properly before attempting to paint. It makes all the difference.
- Make sure to sand, sand and sand. No flat spots. A clean finish will create a great surface for painting.
- Experiment with finishes; save a piece of wood that you are using so you can.
- Conveying emotion in the face and eyes will always get attention.
- "The eyes have it" as they say. Proper eye placement is one of the most challenging areas of the carving and eyes that are not correctly set will throw off the carving.
- Bill angle a droopy bill will cause the whole carving to look awkward. Eye and bill angle go hand in hand.
- Maintain color harmony and feather proportion that reflects the field marking of selected species.
- Each species has its own characteristics that should be executed, from a simple silhouette working through anatomy, to its finish, whether painted or stained.
- Painting a feather pattern differently from one side to another i.e., showing more tertials on one side or dropping a wing slightly as found in true life.
- Expressing gesture through movement is important. When making a floating decoy, flloat your decoys properly.
- In the Interpretive category, line, form and movement are a must. Art is subjective. Some might love your carving, Others won't. It does not matter. It is your creation.
- For Interpretive Wood Sculpture. Educate yourself by studying classic sculpture. Understanding how lines, negative and positive space and all the technical elements work in bronze, ceramic, stone and wood sculpture can make your sculpture better. If your piece would make a strong bronze it is likely a strong sculpture.
- At the end, it is not about the ribbons you may or may not receive. You will leave with awesome memories and lifelong friendships.

Russell Barlow knifes 1884-1933



WOOD TINKER TRIVIA - THE BARLOW KNIFE

The Barlow Knife is one of the most well known *named* knives thanks to a few mentions by Mark Twain in his 1876 novel The Adventures of Tom Sawyer, and again in the sequel The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn.

"Mary gave [Tom] a brand-new "barlow" knife worth twelve and a half cents; and the convulsion of delight that swept his system shook him to his foundations. True, the knife would not cut anything, but it was a "sure-enough" barlow, and there was inconceivable grandeur in that—though where the western boys ever got the idea that such a weapon could possibly be counterfeited to its injury is an imposing mystery and will always remain so, perhaps. Tom contrived to scarify the cupboard with it, and was arranging to begin on the bureau, when he was called off to dress for Sunday school."

"Yes, it was settled; his career was determined. He would run away from home and enter upon it. He would start the very next morning. Therefore, he must now begin to get ready. He would collect his resources together. He went to a rotten log near at hand and began to dig under one end of it with his barlow knife."

"We got an old tin lantern, and a butcher-knife without any handle, and a bran-new Barlow knife worth two bits in any store, and a lot of tallow candles, and a tin candle-stick, and a gourd, and a tin cup,"

"All the stores was along one street. They had white domestic awnings in front, and the country people hitched their horses to the awning-posts. There was empty drygoods boxes under the awnings, and loafers roosting on them all day long, whittling them with their Barlow knives; and chawing tobacco, and gaping and yawning and stretching—a mighty ornery lot."

However Twain was treading a well worn literary path, at least when it came to mentioning Barlow knives. James Fenimore Cooper alluded to Barlows in his 1835 satirical beast fable "The Monikins". "There was an old manufacturer called Whiterock, who has a sort of Barlow-knife reputation among us, and it is not easy to get an other article to compete with his. ...
"I'll stick to the real Barlow, through thick or thin."

The Barlow even found its way into the Congressional Record. Here are two U.S. Senators arguing in 1889 about tariffs on imported knives.

"Mr. Vest [Senator from Missouri]. ...Now we come to the commonest and cheapest knives, used by children and by the poorest persons in the country, one-blade pocket-knives. Mr. George [Senator from Mississippi]. Barlow knives.

Mr. Vest. No, my friend from Mississippi is mistaken; they are not as good as Barlows. The Barlow knife is an excellent knife, the best cheap knife ever manufactured, and these knives are not at all equal to the Barlow knife."

Congressional Record - Senate 1889, page 967

Barlow knives were referenced in America at least as early as 1779. In 1889, the Missouri Senator was likely talking about Barlow knives made by John Russell Cutlery Company, which is often credited with being the first American manufacturer of Barlow knives. John Russell set up his tool and cutlery factory in 1834 at Green River, Massachusetts. When Russell began Barlow manufacture is uncertain, the Barlow design with its distinctive long bolster and Barlow name goes far back into 17th century England, however The Russell Company was certainly making classic Barlows in the 1860s and later.

What makes a Barlow a Barlow?

A sturdy knife having one blade, made from high carbon steel. The bolster on the pivot side is elongated to about 1/3 the closed knife's length, and thick to add strength. Modern Barlows may have two blades, but both pivot on the same side. The long bolster and single sided blade attachment is distinctive of a Barlow. The Russell Barlow brand is famous.

Hospitality.

Hospitality involves:

- 1. Prepare Welcome Packets & Thank You cards before the show day. Mail thank you cards to non-attending raffle donors.
- 2. Distribute Welcome Packets on show day before 9 am. Place Table Number Cards in the proper location on Show tables, along with the welcome packets.

Registration Volunteers

<u>Volunteer & Vendor Registration</u> - At the show first thing (6 a.m.) to: (1) put up signs; and (2) register & wristband volunteers, exhibitors, and vendors and provide a show program to guide them to their tables. The times are from 6 am to the show opening at 9 am, these volunteers work shifts of an hour or more. At least four volunteers are needed. Also, order any needed wristbands.

Admissions Volunteers

Admissions involves taking money, placing wristbands on show attendees, providing show programs and directions. Wristband start and stop numbers are logged to track attendance. Also, checking in late arrival vendors, volunteers and Presenters. They get special exhibitor/volunteer wristbands. Lots of time slots from 9 am to 4 pm. Volunteers here typically work in 1-2 hour shifts.

Mid-Wis. Chippers Club Table Volunteers

Answer questions, sign up new members, sell club patches, hand out club newsletters, 2025 Show fliers and table registration forms. Set up Club history photo albums. Be an ambassador for the club, and woodcarving. Provide information about upcoming carving events and other club's shows and classes.

Tangerman was associated with this magazine for many years. The magazine has come out of the pandemic revitalized. Famous for its show pictures, the Issues include book reviews, patterns, carving tips, how-to's, upcoming classes and events as well as great articles from carvers. Try it; you'll like it. Membership in NWCA is a great bargain at \$29 per year and includes a subscription to Chip Chats.

Wildfowl Carving Magazine in its 40th year is dedicated to decoy and decorative bird carving from songbirds to waterfowl to birds of prey, all sorts of birds are nestled within its pages. A one year subscription to this quarterly publication is \$41.95. Single issue price s \$12.95. Woodcraft of Appleton carries this. Wildlife Carving Magazine also publishes reference books on birds and step by step detailed carving books. If you are a bird carver, this will send your art soaring.

Woodcarving is a British magazine. Recent issue is about 82 pages and available from the Barnes and Nobe bookstore in Appleton. A British take on woodcarving with how tos, patterns, and articles.

Woodcarving Illustrated is a popular quarterly carving magazine (\$24.99 per year). am recent issue was 98 pages. Published since 1997 by Fox Chapel Publishing each issue has lots of patterns, techniques, and projects. Every year or two, Fox Chapel also publishes special issues on **Whittling** & Pyrography. All these are excellent. Fox Chapel also publishes many great specialized carving books by well known artists..

Breakthrough Magazine bills itself as "The Magazine Devoted to the Serious Wildlife Artist." Breakthrough sponsors the biennial World Taxidermy and Fish Carving Championships. The strength of this magazine for carvers is habitat, which is important for both taxidermists and carvers. It is also very good on fish carving. They have published instructional books on Fish Painting, Waterfowl and Bird Finishing and a Habitat and Exhibit Manual. Check them out at: www.breakthroughmagazine.com. A four issue subscription is \$36.



Linda will teach you how to burn a portrait from a photograph that you bring to class. Learn to wood burn a realistic human portrait from a photograph onto a 9" X 12" Baltic Birch plywood plaque. Skills taught include: learning to transfer the pattern to wood; which tips to use for best shading; and how to burn eyes, nose, mouth and hair. Linda will work with you through the whole process.

Students to bring three copies of photograph copied to approximately 9 X 12. One colored copy and 2 black & white. Some previous pyrography experience helpful.

Award Categories

(Limit One Entry per Category - Total of Three Categories)

Wood - Painted and Unpainted Combined

- · Abstract/Ornamental
- Animal
- · Bark Carving
- Bird of Prey/Game Bird
- Caricature

Show Rules

Time: Judging takes place at 8:00 am. All carvings to be judged must be registered and on proper table for judging by 7:45 am. NO EXCEPTIONS

- A maximum of one entry per carving category is allowed (three category limit). Master class is an open category and two entries are allowed.
- Only carvers having a display table can enter judging competition.
 Club members who work majority of show day are the exception; with show coordinator approval, they can enter in competition without having a table.
 All names or identification must be concealed on the carving. Judging number should be visible.
- 4. You cannot retreat to a lower classification if you have won any ribbon in a higher class.
- 5. Carvings entered for competition must have been carved within the last year and must not have been entered in our previous year's show.
- As this is a woodcarving show, no production pieces are allowed. All carving items must be created and carved in wood by the individual present at the show.
- 7. Categories in each class include painted and unpainted carvings.
- 8. If only one carving is entered in a category, judges have authority to eliminate the category and place the carving in another appropriate category. If carving cannot be reassigned to another category, ribbons will be awarded using a points method: first place for 96-120 points, second place for 75-95 points, and third place for 60-74 points.
- 9. Judges may reassign entries to another class at their discretion.
- Entries in group category (two or more carvings) must be mounted on one base - not separate items.
- 11. Advanced and master class carvings, including finishing/painting and habitat, must be solely the creation of the person entering the carving. If an entry is a collaborative effort, all participants must be listed on the judging entry blank.
- 12. Carvings done partially or entirely in a class where an instructor provided any hands-on assistance may not be entered in competition.
- 13. One person from the judging committee will be available in the judging room prior to 7:45 am to assist in placing carvings in their proper category.
- 14. No display lighting or visual effects are allowed in competition.
- 15. Table Fee: \$25. Club members who volunteer to work during the show receive one free table.


Classifications

Novice: Entrant has never won two or more blue ribbons in any competition.

Intermediate: Entrant has won two or more novice class blue ribbons in any competition. May use roughout duplicates. May use driftwood, etc., for habitat. All pieces must be permanently dated.

Advanced: Entrant has won two or more intermediate class blue ribbons or one Best of Show ribbon in any competition. All pieces must be permanently dated.

Master Class: Entrant has won two Best of Show awards. Master Class entries compete for Master Class ribbons but are not eligible for the Best of Show award.



Judging Procedure:

All judging is done on a point system (40 points possible per carving, per judge).

10 points - Creativity

10 points - Workmanship

10 points - Detail

10 points - Quality of Finish

The carving in each category that receives the highest number of points is awarded a first place ribbon. The carving with the second highest number of points is awarded a second place ribbon, etc. In case of a tie, dual ribbons are awarded. If only one entry in a category, ribbon will be awarded using the point system.
